2 Emergency/Topical Motion 1 – Against a centralized police force

Chair: Kevin Lang Aide: Judy Hayman

Conference condemns moves by the SNP Government and the Labour Party to create a single centralized police force in Scotland.

Conference further regrets the current SNP Government's declared intention to create a single Fire and Rescue service for Scotland.

Conference believes:

These changes will deprive communities all over Scotland of locally run and meaningfully accountable emergency services.

The important contribution made by retained fire-fighters and special constables, especially in Scotland's rural communities, could be marginalized within centralized services.

A single centralized police force would be vulnerable to inappropriate political interference by Scottish Ministers.

Conference therefore c alls on the SNP Government to abandon their plans for the creation of single police and fire services; and to press for the establishment of a pilot project in the Highlands and Islands for a single 'blue light' service retaining full decision-making power at local level.

- a) the current regulations for parliamentary selection contests significantly restrict online campaigning, including a ban on the use of social media and 'first-contact' emailing by candidates;

- 2 Conference notes that in 2008-09, across Scotland, 2296 people received a fine
- 3 for possession of drugs, compared to 78 who received a Community Service
- 4 Order (CSO) and 62 who received a Drug Treatment and Testing Order (DTTO).
- 5 Conference also notes that the Central, Fife, Northern and Grampian police force
- areas only handed down one DTTO each in this year for drug possession. 6
- 7 Conference believes that CSOs and DTTOs are far more effective in dealing with
- 8 the route causes of drug offences.
- 9 Conference also believes that fines carry a significant risk that the offender may
- 10 turn to further crime in order to pay the fine.
- 11 Conference therefore calls on the Scottish Government to ask the new Scottish
- 12 Sentencing Council to review sentencing in drug possession cases, with a view
- 13 to ensuring the maximum effective use of DTTOs and CSOs.
- 14 Conference also calls on any such review to take account of the risk of further

15 crime from handing out fines for drug possession.

- 3 SC5: Public sector innovation more effective investment
- 4 Conference notes that the current tight financial climate, changing social
- 5 challenges and rising demand are putting increasing pressure on public services.
- 6 Conference recognises that, in order to meet our ambitions for a fairer and more
- 7 prosperous Scotland and to create opportunities in tough times, there is a need
- 8 for a new approach in the organisation and delivery of public services.

- 9 Conference believes that services are delivered most efficiently and effectively
- when they are responsive to local needs and circumstances, are able to stand
- 11 the test of time and create opportunities for local people to live better lives.
- 12 Conference therefore opposes the SNP and the Labour Party plans to grab
- 13 control of police, fire and care services from local areas and run them from
- Holyrood, believing these to be costly and bureaucratic plans which could be
- damaging to safety, security and care provision in communities across Scotland.

- 17 approaches to preventing and solving problems is a better approach to reform.

- Strategic investment in proven spend-to-save initiatives, such as early
 intervention to give every child a fair start in life, effective action to cut
 reoffending, and measures to shift the balance of care from acute, hospitalbased services to care delivered in the community.
- Support for a high-quality, preventative approach to the challenges faced by our public services through early action to tackle the ticking time-bomb of obesity, a parenting strategy to give people the skills and help they need to support their children, drug and alcohol abuse interventions, and measures proven to steer people away from a life of crime.
- Proposals to bring the organisation and delivery of public services closer to the people who use them by giving more power to head teachers and making them more accountable to parents and the community for the results they achieve, putting GPs back at the heart of 'out of hours' care, and giving local communities the right to influence the policing of their areas.
- Removing the barriers faced by the voluntary sector and social enterprises in the design and delivery of public services, reforming procurement and introducing payment-by-results funding to shift the focus from inputs and supplies to outcomes and success for the long term.
- Action to help people engage with the local decisions and services that affect them, such as giving local communities influence over the budgets of the public agencies operating in their area, increasing community ownership and management of assets or services and publishing more detailed expenditure accounts of local authorities, health boards and other public sector bodies so people can see how their money is being spent.
- Proposals to cut the pay bill of the highest earners in the public sector and set their bonuses to zero, as part of a series of measures to strip out waste and inefficiency in the public sector.
- A power of general competence for local government to give councils the power and flexibility to deliver innovative solutions that last for the people they serve; allowing local authorities to share fairly in the growth and success of their areas by a fairer funding formula for local government and the retention

of business rates and tax receipts arising from additional economic growth and development in their areas.

Conference notes the Strategic Defence Review which has significant implications for the location of military bases in Scotland, including the closure of RAF Kinloss, the future of RAF Leuchars and RAF Lossiemouth and the likely relocation of UK Army bases from Germany to the United Kingdom.

Conference recognizes the key strategic importance of RAF Leuchars and its Quick Reaction Alert to the air defence of northern Britain, and the proximity of RAF Lossiemouth to key training grounds and ranges for its Tornado GR4 bombers.

Conference notes the contribution that all armed forces bases make to the economic and social fabric of the communities in which they are located; and is concerned that the loss of a military base will have a significant impact on its surrounding communities.

Conference recognizes that RAF Leuchars and RAF Lossiemouth perform separate but equally important defence functions and it is detrimental to the defence of the United Kingdom to close either.

- A person's socio-economic background is still a key factor in determining their life chances, and that inequalities of income and wealth have a corrosive effect on all sections of society.
- 2. Britain is among the most unequal societies in the developed world, with the highest rate of poverty in western Europe, and the gap between rich and poor continues to widen.

Conference notes that:

- a) The Equality Act 2010 included a socio-economic duty on public bodies to have due regard to the need to reduce the inequalities of outcome that result from socio-economic disadvantage.
- b) The Scottish Government had indicated that once this duty in the Equality Act was commenced, it would be established in Scotland.
- 15 Conference regrets the decision taken by the Home Secretary Teresa May in
- November 2010 to scrap the socio-economic duty and to look into repealing the
- 17 law that allowed for its creation.

18 Conference further regrets that:

- I. The Scottish Government has not met the recommendation of the Local Government and Communities Committee that government policies should be 'poverty proofed' through poverty impact assessments, in the same way that policies are currently assessed for their impact on equalities.
- II. The Scottish Government's Single Outcome Agreements have not been sufficiently effective in identifying how local spending decisions impact on levels of poverty and inequality.
- 26 Conference therefore calls on the Scottish Government to introduce a robust
- 27 socio-economic duty to ensure that local and central government spending
- 28 decisions contribute to efforts to reduce socio-economic inequalities in Scotland.
